
## **Sanitizing Hands**

- You must sanitize your hands before petting a cat.
- Condo housed cats sanitize between cages
- Runners and playroom –just once for all
  Help remind each other to sanitize hands



#### We are supported entirely by donations

#### Our first responsibility is the cats. The second is the program.





C.A.T.S. is known for the care we give our cats and the cleanliness of the shelter.

#### And we want to keep it that way.



<u>All</u> Volunteers help to keep the shelter clean and smelling nice in some way.



Our cats and kittens ask that you follow the rules.

It is for their safety and yours!

As a volunteer at C.A.T.S.
Our first concern is your safety and the safety of the cats.

Please follow all <u>posted signs</u>

 If you are scratched or bitten, get a supervisor immediately.

We do not allow rough play or teasing of the cats or kittens.



- Please leave the room and find something else to do when customers are looking at cats.
- Please keep your voices down especially in the lobby (It is difficult to hear when using the phone)
- Keep Busy

#### **A Few More Basics**

 <u>Do Not interfere with an adoption or</u> <u>discussion</u> between Adoption Counselors, staff and customers.

 Adoption Counselors are trained to ask certain questions and listen for answers.

#### A Couple of Safety Items

Do Not leave condo doors open unless they are blocked open

Do Not feed the cats treats

Do Not bring out side toys into the shelter

## Now let's talk about what C.A.T.S. is...and what we do here.

#### WHAT WE DO AT C.A.T.S.

•C.A.T.S. rescues stray and abandoned cats in Jackson County.

•C.A.T.S. is a full adoption shelter.
•C.A.T.S. does <u>not</u> take ferals.
•C.A.T.S. does <u>not age</u> discriminate.
•We take older cats.
•They make great companions!

•The cats must be able to be picked up by a stranger. •We understand it takes time to adjust.  C.A.T.S. does not take "owner surrendered" cats. (Exception noted below)

 C.A.T.S. does consider the death (or move to a care facility) of an owner a form of abandonment and will take the cat if there are no family members able to care for the cat.

## The cats stay in our program until adopted. We <u>do not</u> euthanize cats to make room for more.



 The only time a cat is euthanized is if it has tested positive for FELV or FIV, is extremely aggressive and can not be tested or handled.

 If a cat is injured or sick, a veterinarian determines if the cat can be saved and have a quality of life.

- C.A.T.S. TESTS ALL cats for feline leukemia and feline immunodeficiency virus - if they are six months of age or older.
- Kittens under six months, without a mother to test, are tested for feline leukemia only.
- The cats are tested upon arrival.
- Cats and/or kittens going to foster homes are tested prior to going into a foster home.

- C.A.T.S. isolates the cats in a separate building for a minimum of seven days to monitor for health and behavior. (Unless they are going directly to a foster home)
- C.A.T.S. vaccinates all cats against five major diseases. The vaccinations include two doses, given 21 days apart.
- C.A.T.S. treats all cats and kittens with Revolution® to treat fleas, ear mites, hookworms, roundworms and heartworms.
- C.A.T.S. treats all cats and kittens with Drontal® for tapeworm and other parasites.

- C.A.T.S. bathes every cat with an antibacterial upon arrival into the shelter.
- The cats and kittens are wrapped in towels, warmed in the dryer, after their baths.
- They are held and loved while being dried.
- When the towel starts to cool, it is replaced by more warm towels.

- At this point the cats ears are cleaned again
- Nails are trimmed
- Their file photo is taken
- The kittens receive a paper collar with their name on it.
- They are then introduced to their new condo



C.A.T.S. spays and neuters all cats and kittens.

No adopted cat leaves the building until it is neutered.

C.A.T.S. uses early spay and neuter practices. We have done so for more than 17 years. Females are spayed at 2.5 pounds and male cats at 2.0 pounds.

Altering pets helps prevent the unwanted birth of animals that would be difficult to place into good homes.





- C.A.T.S. uses trained Adoption Counselors and extensive adoption application forms.
- C.A.T.S. always takes our cats back.





We offer a price break when two cats are adopted together.

\$130 for two – saving of \$20

If we insist two cats be adopted together, C.A.T.S. will provide another price incentive We charge \$75 to adopt one cat \$65 if the cat is 5 years of age or older.





#### Each day:

The cages are completely cleaned. First with soap & water Next with water & bleach Every item is removed Side, bottom, roof and doors are cleaned.

A new litter box is given
Food and water dishes cleaned or replaced
New food and water given
Two new blankets (matching) are placed in the cage
A new rug is placed in the cage
Matching toys are placed in cage

We have adopted more than 8000 cats in 18 years 460 cats were adopted in 2009 We house approximately 45 at a time in our shelter 40 in our isolation unit 25+ in foster care at any given time

Everyone except Adoption Counselors are required to wear a smock or scrub top.

Sometimes you will be asked to change a smock after handling cats. Please wear a Volunteer or Jr. Volunteer pin

#### **Junior Volunteers**

 Junior volunteers (if you did not drive yourself) are not allowed to leave the building once you are here.

 A parent or guardian must come inside to get you when you are finished.

 You must wear a smock and a "Jr. Volunteer" tag.

#### About the "Dress Code"

C.A.T.S. strives to present a professional atmosphere. \*Clothes must be clean

\*Ragged bottom jeans are not good idea – they are germ catchers

\*Clothing must be in good taste.

\*Smocks or scrub tops must be worn

\*Shoes should be safe to walk in and clean

## Cat Toys

- We have a "CLEAN" toy box and a "DIRTY" toy box in Rooms 1 and 2, located in the white cabinets
- More toys are in the kitchen

 If the dirty toy box is getting full, check with a senior volunteer for directions on cleaning.

#### Every cat gets a chance to run

- A <u>daily run schedule</u> is posted in Rooms 1 and 2.
- Each cat is allowed out of their condo for at least 45 minutes a day.
- Room 1 and Room 2 have different ways of dealing with running.
- The cat's litter box is placed on the floor (under the chair) during their run time. Food and water stay in the cage during the run time.
- Senior volunteers will direct you regarding the run schedule.

## Room 1 Running

Between each condo's run turn:

- Put the cat(s) back
- Put the litter box back and straighten the condo
- Pick up the toys and put into the dirty toy box
- Sweep the floor
- Mop the floor (wringing out the mop as much as you can) (several times)
- Put out the next condo of kittens or cat
- Put down two or three clean toys

MARK THE DAILY RUN SCHEDULE ON THE WALL

Repeat the process with each cage in Room 1

## Room 2 Running

- Put the litter box out and a clean toy
- After the cat's turn is completed...
- Put the box back in the condo
- Put toys in the "dirty" toy box
- Sweep the floor
- It is not necessary to mop between cats in Room 2 unless otherwise posted in the room
- Repeat after each cat
- MARK THE DAILY RUN SCHEDULE ON THE
   WALL

There are supplies located through out the shelter.

Brooms and dust pans are in each room and are labeled.

The lobby and outside brooms are in the laundry room.

#### Laundry is a BIG part of C.A.T.S.



Each laundry basket is labeled.

# Please help keep the laundry caught up.

# You will be shown how to do a load of laundry.



We use dry laundry soap and dry bleach. It is highly concentrated.

The soap and bleach are in large containers next to the washer.

It is always one scoop per load.

Do not put the soap or bleach in in the center. Put the soap and bleach in before the laundry

## Clean the dryer vent after each use.

**GROOMING TOOLS** are located on the kitchen counter Use one grooming tool per condo. DO NOT SHARE with another condo. Use a clean tool. Runners and playroom cats can share grooming tools After use, <u>remove the hair</u> and dip the brush into cleaning bowl, lay out to dry. **Do Not** let the grooming tools soak.

EVERYONE GET A CHANCE TO CLEAN A BOX (unless you are pregnant)

- You will be guided by an experienced volunteer.
- Follow the instructions of the senior volunteer



#### It all starts at the bottom(!)

You will need one dirty box. A lined waste can (Use the square plastic buckets) A bucket of soapy water 8 clean scoops for Rooms 1 and 2 1 clean scoop for the playroom 1 clean scoop for the lobby/office

#### **REMEMBER – One scoop per box for condos**

## LITTER SCOOPS



After use, they are placed in a bucket of hot soapy water to soak Then they are scrubbed Rinsed in clean water Dipped in a bucket of bleach and water solution. Placed on a towel to dry If you are asked to scoop boxes, this includes cleaning the scoops

#### Sign In and Out

- Please sign in and out each time you arrive.
- This is your responsibility
- This is especially true if you are doing the volunteer work for class credit.
- Each month there is a new sheet
